

LETTER FROM THE Founders

2021 was a trying, but phenomenal year in service as we continued to inspire communities to ask So What Else...can we do to help? We saw our Emergency Food Response team led by Megan Joe and Christine Garrahan, rescue and distribute nearly 8 million meals to 65,000 individuals throughout the Baltimore-Washington Metro Area.

Our Youth Development area slowly transitioned from virtual after school programs back to the in-person programs that our youth so desperately needed. Our summer camps hosted over 52 weeks of good old fashioned fun as well as social and emotional learning and innovation.

We expanded in DC and Baltimore with four new full time sites, getting nearly 3's of the way back to our 3,658 kids we served in 2019. In the fall we kicked off two new full time programs at Cedar Heights in SE and Washington View apartments in NE welcoming in sets of new and eager children.

So What Else created over 50 new, meaningful jobs helping our service economy bounce back. We believe SWE had the impact of a 18.5 million dollar organization as we took in over 16 million dollars worth of in-kind donations to distribute directly to the community which included: Christmas toy drives, Thanksgiving meals, clothing and home goods. We even furnished 37 houses this year all with the help of community donations.

Although 2021 proved to be a year of uncertainty and confusion, it was also a year where people came together to help serve those in need. The compassion and dedication of SWE staff, volunteers, and clients made all the challenges worth it. We hope to have an even greater and more impactful 2022.

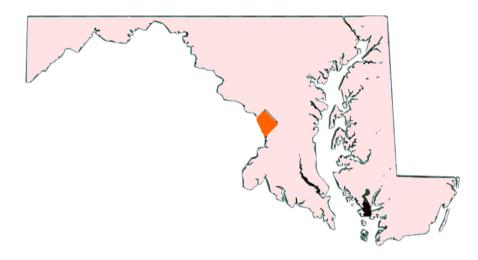
OUR DROGRANS

STANDING BY OUR MISSION

When Covid first struck in March, 2020, the team at So What Else immediately responded by asking our program sites, "If we can't do programs right now, So What Else.....can we do to help?" And the communities replied with an overwhelming need for food, diapers and basic necessities. So our team at So What Else answered by mobilizing volunteers and distributing those items directly to the communities in need. Breaking down transportation, age, ability, qualification and language barriers, to get families basic necessities. Now in 2021, we have continued to stand by our mission to offer access to food, diapers, clothing, furniture, books, PPE and more to our community. Our powerhouse volunteer and in-kind donation structure allow So What Else to make the impact of a \$16 million organization, while only operating with \$1.5 million.

And although the Emergency Hunger Relief Program has grew astoundingly over the past two years, So What Else has remained steadfast in our commitment to serving children and has continued offering after school programs, summer camps, teen clubs and family events through our youth development branch.

Now, So What Else is proud to serve as a regional hub to offer families living in underserved communities access to the opportunities and food security that each and everyone of us deserve.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT

FOOD PANTRY

On May 18, 2020 SWE opened up our first warehouse to the public as a "**walk-up**" food pantry where we served about 100 families per day. The food pantry drew crowds from across the region and we soon outgrew our initial location.

In July, 2021 SWE moved the food pantry to Lake Forest Mall, where we have an indoor and outdoor warehouse, a storage unit, a free shop and are able to accommodate the 400 or more families that visit the warehouse each day.

The So What Else Food Pantry now hosts 2,900 volunteers per year and has the capacity to serve millions of meals through its 5-pronged distribution method: neighborhood pop-up pantry, home delivery, walk-up, group pick up and group drop-off.

EVALUATIONS

This year, as So What Else slowly regains momentum in re-opening youth programs, our leadership team made it a priority to create and execute evaluations on our Emergency Hunger Relief Program.

MAJOR FINDINGS

- **95%** of Food Pantry clients are satisfied with the services they receive from So What Else
- **100%** of clients believe that the food that they receive from So What Else is healthy and nutritious
- **100%** of clients feel that they are more food secure now that they have access to So What Else's Hunger Relief Program
- **86%** of clients say they have felt an increase in their level of health and wellness after utilizing So What Else services for one or more months. (Many attribute this fact to decrease in stress due to not having to make tough financial decisions and being able to stretch their monthly budget)

PROGRAM Strategy

Through taking into account the dozens of food access barriers as well as lack of opportunities for children from low-income households, So What Else connects families with the resources they need, building hope and resiliency in the community.

YOUTH Development

COMMUNITY CENTER MODEL

This model serves as an open door to children of all ages and their families 5 days a week during after school hours. These programs also aim to build community through incorporating family and community events, meal service and workshops, all free of cost to anyone in need.

CURRICULUM BASED PROGRAMMING

85% of our programs are now operated based on one of our 8 comprehensive, hands-on learning curricula that integrate positive youth development, common core outcomes and The 10 Pillars to provide students with a meaningful and fun learning experience.

FUTURE LEADERS PROGRAM

This program engages older youth and young adults to become proactive in their community through serving others. This year, SWE tuture leaders program completed grew to nearly 150 youth who completed nearly 1000 hours of service.

STRATEGIC COMMUNITY PARTNERING

This year, we collaborated with over 100 different non-profits, businesses, schools and community centers in order to bring high quality programs to youth who need it the most.

THE BIG IDEA PROGRAM

SWE's Big Idea Program is the cornerstone of our mission to support the community through philanthropy and youth innovation. The Big Idea is an educational and interactive program designed to encourage students to create novel and innovative ways to serve their community and Earth. Through teamwork, open dialogue, activism and ultimately action, students are able to learn and demonstrate that people of any age can create positive change.

HUNGER Response

NEIGHBORHOOD DELIVERY

A team of volunteers and staff make deliveries every week to 85 communities. This community-based distribution model or "pop-up food pantry" ensures accessibility for children and families without transportation to receive healthy food in their apartment complexes.

FOOD PANTRY

SWE's food warehouse, located at Lake Forest Mall in Gaithersburg, acts as a "walk-up" food pantry where we now serve food and supplies to at least 400 families per day. SWE's average client's family is made up of a female head-of-household with multiple children.

HOME DELIVERY

Our team delivers food and diapers to over 300 individual family homes per week.

GROUP PICK UP

Over 100 churches and community organizations drive to the SWE pantry and warehouse to pick up and re-deliver meals that feed up 50-75 families per group in their home communities.

GROUP DROP OFF

A SWE team member delivers food in bulk to up to 6 community organizations per week, which then redistributes it to their constituents.

BASIC NECESSITIES ACCESS

In addition to meals and groceries, So What Else distributes high volumes of necessities to families in need. In 2021, SWE distributed 1.48 million diapers, 210,000 lbs of clothing, 60,000 educational items, and102,000 PPE.

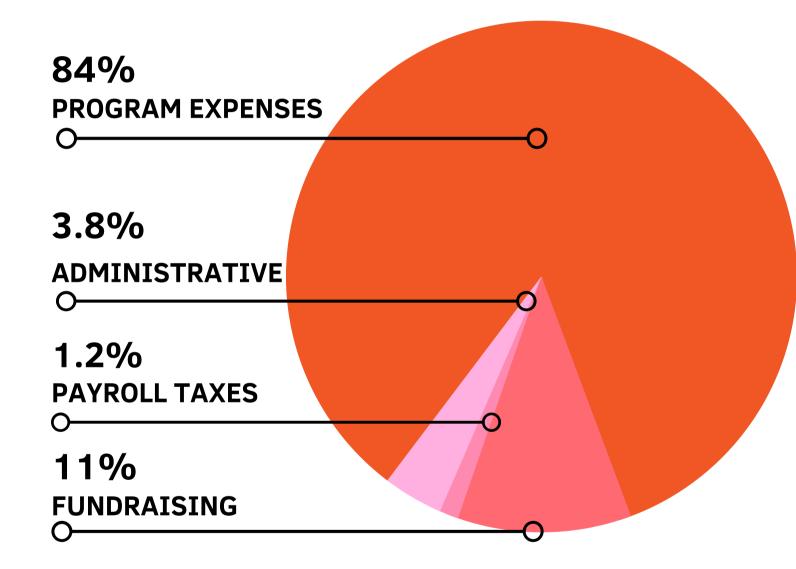

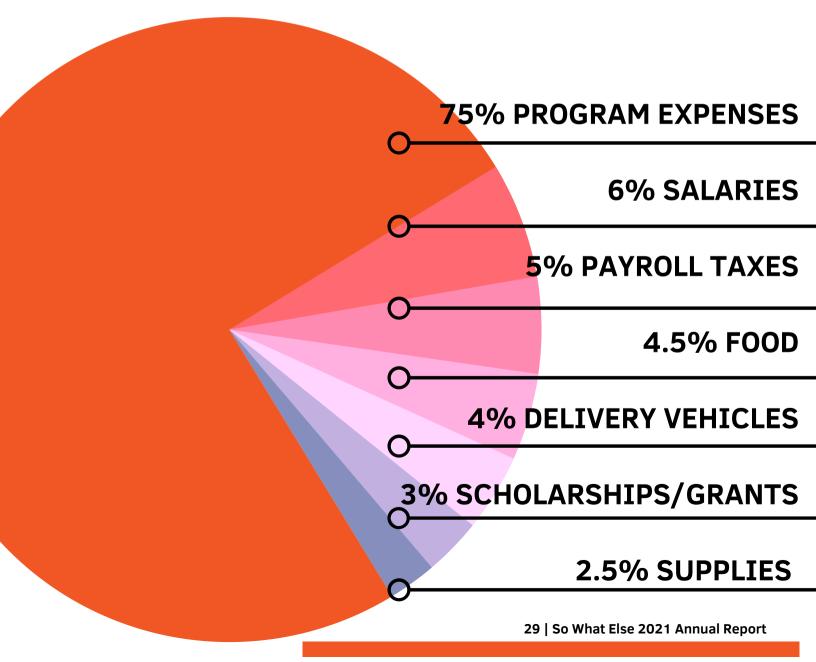
ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES
